Lucy Kaplansky



She started out singing in Chicago bars. Then, barely out of high school, Lucy Kaplansky took off for New York City. There she found a fertile community of songwriters and performers-Suzanne Vega, John Gorka, Bill Morrissey, Cliff Eberhardt, and others-where she fit right in. With a beautiful flair for harmony, Lucy was everyone's favorite singing partner, but most often she found herself singing as a duo with Shawn Colvin. People envisioned big things for them; in fact, The New York Times said it was "easy to predict stardom for her."
 Lucy's steady rise in the music world is marked by a number of distinctions since her last release, including performances on the CBS Early Show, NPR's Weekend Edition with Scott Simon and Morning Edition with Bob Edwards, singing harmony vocals on Bryan Ferry's latest album Frantic, performing on the Greg Brown tribute album Driftless (along with Ani DiFranco, Iris Dement, Mary Chapin Carpenter, Gillian Welch, Shawn Colvin, Eliza Gilkyson and others), as well as having her song "Guilty as Sin" featured in the NBC television show Ed - all the while performing non-stop throughout Canada, Ireland and the U.K. in support of her last album. Talent and hard work continue to pay off for Lucy - "The Red Thread" is a stunning achievement. "[Kaplansky] brings a winning charm, healthy folk soprano and sound interpretive instincts to the task easy to predict stardom for her." - New York Times

Garnet Rogers



Chris Trapper



Chris Trapper's songs have been winning awards as well as the hearts of devoted listeners ever since his arrival in Boston from Buffalo in 1991. He is most widely known as the front man for the nationally acclaimed pop/rock band The Push Stars, whose "honest, heartfelt songs with timeless melodies" were described as "the kind of music that songwriters love" by Rob Thomas of Matchbox Twenty.
 With The Push Stars, Chris has written material for four studio albums and three self-produced discs. Several of his songs have been picked up for major motion picture soundtracks including There's Something About Mary and Say it isn't So and for television shows such as ER and Malcolm in the Middle. His 2002 solo project "Songs from the Drive-In" showcased "his formidable storytelling talents," according to the Boston Phoenix.
 In addition to numerous Boston Music Awards, Chris Trapper received two Gold Records, a Platinum record, and the prestigious SOCAN Award twice for his songwriting work with Newfoundland's Great Big Sea. Antigone Rising covered his song "Waiting, Watching, Wishing" on their latest album release. His second solo release, "Gone Again," serves up 11 new songs with a Dixieland flavor provided by Boston's renowned Wolverine Jazz Band.

**Chris Chandler
 with David Roe**



Chris Chandler, who hails from the south, is a traveling bard who brings together storytelling, social commentary, and music and weaves them into a compelling, entertaining, and amazing experience. For this very special concert, he will be accompanied by former Upstater, David Roe on piano and guitar, and vocals Steffon Moody writes of Chandler: "Born in Georgia, the son of a Baptist minister, Chris Chandler found his own way of spreading 'The Word.' He takes the pulse of America, and then with equal parts acidic irony and utopian idealism, casts his prognosis to audiences at the rate of up to 250 shows per year. Part preacher, poet, huckster, wandering minstrel and medicine show sideman, Chandler casts a spell over an audience with a slight southern drawl and conjures the profane with the profound. The historical past is mingled with the hysterical present. A gritty Americana blends with a grand oratorical style. "His wordy creations owe as much to the traditions of theater and slam poetry as to music. Chandler works with a musician, weaving his poetry with traditional songs in a way that gives the songs new life. Utah Phillips said, "He is the best performance poet I have ever seen."

Pat Wictor



Pat Wictor stands out in a crowd. With flowing red hair and zen-like calm, he sings in a pure voice and makes his instrument, the lap-style slide guitar, "sing" back to him. He can bring a room to silence, weaving several parts on his guitar and reaching quietly into each listener's heart. And his songs, drawn from the deep wells of rural blues, gospel, and country music, linger in the mind long after he's done. Pat will be joined for this performance by Jen Schoenwald and, Cheryl Prashker of Full Frontal Folk.

Gearoid O'hAllmhurain and Patrick Ourceau



Shaped by generations of anonymous folk performers who performed in kitchens, pubs, and celebrations throughout their country, Irish traditional music remains a complex and illusive art. You can enter this unique musical community of true Irish roots performers who've kept the light on for centuries-old tunes, but only after a long and discerning apprenticeship and a sustained relationship with this living tradition. Performers Gearoid O'hAllmhurain (from County Clare, Ireland) and Patrick Ourceau (from Paris) enjoy unique and coveted positions within the extended family of Irish music makers on both sides of the North Atlantic.
 Gearoid is an accomplished multi-instrumentalist, performer and music instructor, with several All-Ireland competitive titles on the concertina and uilleann pipes to his credit. He is also a former member of the renowned Killenora Ceili Band, the oldest traditional dance band in Ireland and seven-time All Ireland Ceili Band champions. Gearoid is also a faculty member at the University of San Francisco, where this leading Irish historian and anthropologist specializes in ethnomusicology.
 Patrick lived in Paris in the 1970s, when traditional Irish music was finding new audiences in Europe, particularly in France. He began to play fiddle and was inspired by fellow Parisians Vincent Bliin, Herve Cantal and Michel Ferry. Meetings and sessions with Irish musicians Paddy Glackin, Gearoid O'hAllmhurain, and Garry Shanon eventually led him to Ireland, where he was introduced to the musical dialects of County Clare and East Galway. A move to New York City followed, so Patrick could become part of the Irish music scene which had been molded by generations of immigrant performers. Here he met Martin Mulhaire, Andy McGann, Paddy Reynolds, and other celebrated masters, as well as folk composers Jack Coen and Mike Rafferty from East Galway who fueled his interest in the music of Ballinakill and Aughrim.

Harmonious Wail



Harmonious Wail draws from the rich influence of the European gypsy musicians, most notably Django Reinhardt and Stephane Grappelli who from the 1930s on created and developed what came to be known as Gypsy Swing. What sets the Wail apart from other wonderful talent in this growing genre is the vocal excellence of Maggie Delaney-Pothoff. The intoxicating arrangements and the sheer joy the Wail brings to every performance is downright addictive.

Full Frontal Folk



Combining the talents of Fatale Frontal (Wendy Fulur), Lolita Frontal (Jennifer Schonwald), and Delilah Frontal (Courtney Malley) results in a full sensory experience. Each is an individually accomplished musician and singer in her own right, but as a band they are combustible. They combine a "Gen-X" attitude with good solid Folk Music sensibilities. Add to the mix their fun sense of personal style and off the wall sense of humor and you'll find yourself immersed in the Full Frontal Folk unique spin on the folk music genre. The band shares a love of traditional, old-timey traditional, bluegrass music and celtic, as well as contemporary singer-songwriter, pop & punk. Like their musical influences, they want to push the envelope and bring elements of all genres to their repertoire. Not surprisingly, they succeed with sensitivity and attention to detail. Contemporary songs made famous by The Eagles or Bad Religion may quickly follow traditional songs, like Catie Cruel or Blood and Gold. All songs are delivered with beautiful vocal arrangements, which are at times polished, quirky, haunting, or poignant. Their instrumentation, including 6 and 12 string guitars, fiddle, mandolin and percussion, never takes away from their powerful voices. This is a show you don't want to miss.
